Have You Seen a Blanding's Turtle?

Blanding's turtles live in marshes, shallow bays of lakes, and shallow, slow-moving rivers, and Cherokee Marsh has all of these. A 1980s survey of the Cherokee Marsh Scientific Area (now called the Cherokee Marsh State Natural Area) noted the presence of Blanding's turtles. The turtles are a state-threatened species whose numbers have declined due to roadkill and loss of wetlands. A key to identifying a Blanding's is the bright yellow underside of the neck on turtles 3-5 years old and older. In spring, the turtles may travel over a mile to lay their eggs on sandy ground. You might also see one foraging or basking in the sun along the shoreline. For a picture and more information, see:

A series of walks within the Upper Yahara River Watershed and beyond, extending from Earth Week to Yahara Lakes Week or Take a Stake in the Lakes Days.

Watershed Walks begin at 6:30 p.m.

- April 22** *Patrick Marsh*
Earth Week **Friends of Patrick Marsh** **Stone Quarry Road, Sun Prairie**
Highway 151 south on Columbus Street, east on Stone Quarry Road. Meet Mark Smith, Patrick Marsh Middle School Science Teacher at the wildlife area parking lot kiosk: (608-834-7686).
- April 29** *Culver Conservancy* **Token Creek Watershed Association** **3667 Egge Road, DeForest**
Highway 19, north on Portage Road, east on Egge Road. Meet John and/or Judith Hutchinson of Token Creek Watershed Association for a glimpse of the springs and progress of the restoration of Token Creek: (608-837-2758).
- May 6** *Cherokee Marsh* **Friends of Cherokee Marsh** **6098 North Sherman Ave., Madison**
North Sherman Avenue ends in a gravel road to parking lot. Meet Russ Hefty, Conservation Resource Supervisor and Jan Axelson of the Friends of Cherokee Marsh to visit a sedge meadow and wet prairie. - May 20** *Jackson's Landing* **Town of Westport** **5485 Willow Road, Waunakee**
County Highway M, then south on Willow Road. Meet Jim Stephenson at the Willows Tavern parking lot. Hear the history of this site while viewing the vital wildlife habitat of these preserved wetlands. (*same contact as above)
- May 27** *Governor's Island* **Mendota Mental Health Institute** **Cinder Lane, Madison**
Access Main Drive via Green Avenue or Troy Drive left onto Cinder Lane into parking lot. Meet Gary Maier for his interpretation of Effigy Mounds. (Come early if you wish to walk the Governor's Island loop on your own).*
- June 3** *Holy Wisdom Monastery* **Benedictine Women of Madison** **4200 Co. Hwy. M, Middleton**
County Highway M entrance, then curve to the lower left parking lot. Meet Paul Boutwell to see progress of landscape plans for storm water management considerations surrounding the new LEED certified building and the impact of Lost Lake and the upland prairies on lake quality: (608-836-1631 ext. 121).
- June 10** *Pheasant Branch Creek Conservancy*

The Seminole Highway parking lot, from the Beltline, is on your right after you pass the marsh and begin to climb a small hill, or on your left a ¼ mile after you cross PD.
